

This document contains key information you should know about the Series D securities of Canoe Canadian Small Mid Cap Fund (the “Fund”). You can find more detailed information in the Fund’s simplified prospectus. On February 22, 2019, Canoe Financial became the manager, trustee and portfolio manager of the Fund and Fiera Capital Corporation (“Fiera Capital”) was appointed as sub-advisor of the Fund. The Fund will merge into Canoe Canadian Small Mid Cap Portfolio Class (consisting of Canoe Canadian Small Mid Cap Class and units of Canoe Trust Fund) no later than December 31, 2019. Upon the completion of the merger, Fiera Capital will become sub-advisor of Canoe Canadian Small Mid Cap Portfolio Class.

### What does the Fund invest in?

The Fund aims to achieve over the longer term the highest possible return that is consistent with a fundamental investment philosophy. The Fund invests primarily in Canadian equity securities issued by Canadian companies, with a significant bias toward small to medium capitalization stocks. The Fund may invest up to 30 percent of Fund assets in equity securities of foreign companies.

### How risky is it?

The value of the Fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

### Risk rating

Canoe Financial has rated the volatility of this Fund as **medium to high**.

This rating is based on how much the Fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the Fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

### No guarantees

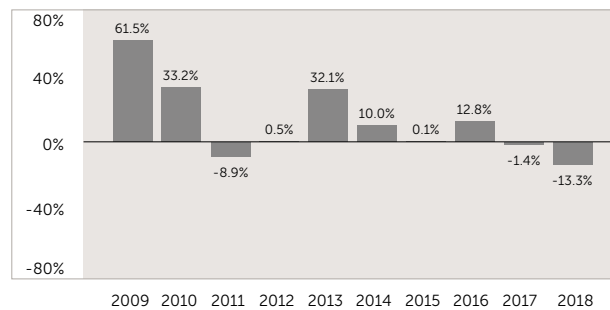
Like most mutual funds, this Fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

### How has the Fund performed?

This section shows how Series D units of the Fund have performed over the past 10 calendar years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the Fund's returns.

#### Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Series D units of the Fund performed in each of the past 10 calendar years. This series of the Fund dropped in value in 3 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the Fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the Fund will perform in the future.



### Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for the Series D units of the Fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 calendar years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

### Average return

The annual compounded return of this series of the Fund was 10.7% over the past 10 years. If you had invested \$1,000 in this series of the Fund 10 years ago, your investment would now be worth \$2,764.

## Who is this Fund for?

Investors who:

- want to enhance the growth potential of your portfolio through exposure to small and medium size companies
- have a medium to long term investment horizon
- are comfortable with a medium to high level of investment risk.

## A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your Fund in a non-registered account, Fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

## How much does it cost?

The following tables outline the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series D units of the Fund. The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds, series and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

### 1. Sales charges

There are no sales charges to purchase Series D units. However, Series D investors pay a separate fee to their representative.

### 2. Fund expenses:

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the Fund's returns.

As of September 30, 2018 the expenses of Series D units of this Fund were 1.70% of its value. This equals \$17.00 for every \$1,000 invested.

### More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the Fund. It is for the services and/or advice that your representative and/or their firm provide to you.

Canoe Financial pays the trailing commission to your firm. It is paid from the Fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment.

- **Initial sales charge option** – up to 0.25% of the value of your investment each year. This equals \$2.50 each year for every \$1,000 invested.

### 3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch securities of the Fund.

Fee	What You Pay
<b>Short-term trading fee</b>	You may be charged 2% of the current value of the securities, if you redeem or switch them within 30 days of purchase. The fee is paid to the Fund.
<b>Switch fee</b>	Your investment firm may charge you up to 2% of the current value of the securities you switch.

### What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund securities within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
