

This document contains key information you should know about the Series A securities of Canoe Equity Income Portfolio Class (the "Fund") which consists of a series A share of the Canoe Equity Income Class and a unit of the Canoe Trust Fund, if you do not already own a unit. What does the Fund invest in?

The Fund aims to provide capital appreciation with some potential for income by investing primarily in Canadian equity and fixed income securities. The Fund may invest up to 30% of its assets in foreign securities.

How risky is it?

The value of the Fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

Canoe Financial has rated the volatility of this Fund as **low to medium**.

This rating is based on how much the Fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the Fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

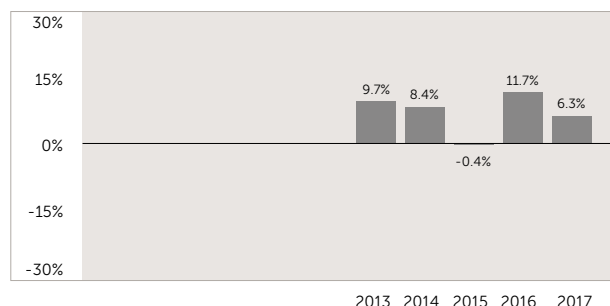
Like most mutual funds, this Fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the Fund performed?

This section shows how Series A shares of the Fund have performed over the past 5 calendar years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the Fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Series A shares of the Fund performed in each of the past 5 calendar years. This series of the Fund dropped in value in 1 of the 5 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the Fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the Fund will perform in the future.



Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for the Series A shares of the Fund in a 3-month period over the past 5 calendar years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

The annual compounded return of this series of the Fund was 6.8% since inception. If you had invested \$1,000 in this series of the Fund when it was created, your investment would now be worth \$1,483.

Who is this Fund for?

Investors who:

- are investing for the medium to long-term
- are seeking a steady flow of income and modest capital growth
- have a low to medium tolerance for risk.

Do not invest in this fund unless you are willing to accept the potential loss of a portion of your investment, or if you have a short-term investment horizon.

How much does it cost?

The following tables outline the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series A shares of the Fund. The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

You have to choose a sales charge option when you buy a Fund. Ask about the pros and cons of each option.

2. Fund expenses:

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the Fund's returns.

As of December 31, 2017 the expenses of Series A shares of this Fund were 2.74% of its value. This equals \$27.40 for every \$1,000 invested.

Management Expense Ratio (MER) This is the total of the management fee (including the trailing commission), administration fee and operating expenses. Canoe Financial waived some of the series' expenses. If it had not done so, the MER would have been higher.	2.60%

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the Fund. It is for the services and advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

Canoe Financial pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the Fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment. The rate depends on the sales charge option you choose.

- **Initial sales charge option** – up to 1.00% of the value of your investment each year. This equals \$10 each year for every \$1,000 invested.
- **Low-load option** – up to 0.50% for the first three years and 1.00% thereafter based on the value of your investment each year. For the first three years, this equals \$5 each year for every \$1,000 invested. After three years, it can equal up to \$10 each year for every \$1,000 invested.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch shares of the Fund.

Fee	What You Pay
Short-term trading fee	You may be charged 2% of the current value of the shares, if you redeem or switch them within 30 days of purchase. The fee is paid to the Fund.
Switch fee	Your investment firm may charge you up to 2% of the current value of the shares you switch.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund securities within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
